We always encourage and emphasise the importance of children seeking out an adult they trust when faced with a situation they are unsure of.

#### **Survivor Unit**

This term, our 5/6 students have been working on an amazing and interesting term unit called "Survivors". In each class, the students are put into six groups: the Crocodiles, Echidnas, Redbacks, Bluetongues, Magpies and Kangaroos. In these groups, there are four or five people. These four or five students will sit together and work together this term. If the team shows kindness and respect or does well in class, they can be rewarded with a certain amount of resources (points). These resources can be used to gain advantages or clue idols in the survivor challenges that happen every fortnight when all the survivor groups come together and complete a challenge. Various activities include physical tasks, critical thinking, and academics. When these tasks are complete, teams earn a survivor badge. ## **Canberra High School Visit**

# **Traffic Information**

Traffic congestion is a common issue around most schools during the morning and afternoon peak periods. Roads aren't designed to cope with the sudden increase in traffic volumes for 15-20 minute periods each morning and afternoon. There is no traffic engineering solution to resolve this problem, roads and carparks simply aren't built to meet the high demand over a short period.

If you need to drive, a simple way to reduce the congestion around our school is to use part way drop off or collection points. Part way points can significantly reduce the burden on the local road network. They are ideal for families who live too far away from the school to walk or ride for the entire journey.

Consider dropping off and collecting students from a location that is a short distance from the school that provides safe and easy access. Not only will you help to reduce congestion around the school, children will also receive the health benefits for walking or riding part of the trip. Useful resources are available on the <u>Transport Canberra</u> website.



Road safety around schools is a matter for everyone in the community. Speed, illegal parking and the volume of cars on the road all reduce safety for children, so it is important to drive cautiously near schools.

Speed, congestion and poor parking are all factors that can impact the safety of children. Often these poor behaviours arise from people within the school community itself, so it is important to remember that your behaviour is equally as important as the next person. If you need to drive to school, please obey the road rules and be polite and respectful to other drivers. A little bit of patience and courtesy can go a long way to protecting the safety of children.

### Please remember to:

- Drive very slowly through the car park (max 10km/h) and please be alert for children at all times.
- Minimise the days you drive your children by encouraging them to walk or ride.
